## George L. Compo

PENSACOLA, Fla. — Graveyard services with full military honors for Rear Adm. George L. Compo, 91, of Pensacola, Fla. and a native of Potsdam, were held in November in Barrancas National Cemetery.

Rear Adm. Compo died Oct. 29, 1983 in Florida.

The Oak Lawn Funeral Home of Pensacola was in charge of the arrangements.

Surviving are his wife, Jean; two sons, George L., Jr. of Warrington, Fla. and Louis R. of Virginia Beach, Va.; two daughters, Mrs. David C. Lake of Santa Fe, Calif. and Mrs. James F. Parker of Tustin, Calif.; 14 grandchildren; and nine great-grandchildren.

A native of Potsdam, Adm. Compo was a 1917 graduate of Potsdam Normal School, entering the U.S. Naval Aviation program in May of that year.

He was ordered to England in late 1917, where he later earned the Navy Cross for "distinguished and heroic service in an aeroplane on the Belgian Front during September, October, and November of 1918 bombing enemy installations."


During his Navy career, Adm. Compo was a principal in the development of the "flying bomb" and worked as an aviator with Carl Norden on the Norden bomb sight.

He served on several battleships, carriers, and seaplane tenders. Prior to being commissioned, he was the first executive officer of the Corpus Christi Naval Air Station in Texas and later was the first commanding officer of the NAS Guantanamo Bay, Cuba.

He later served a tour as commanding officer, and commander of Naval Operating Base, Saipan, as governor of the Northern Marianas Islands, and as the military government officer in the Bonin Islands.

He retired from the Navy in 1949 and had lived in Pensacola, Fla. for the past 32 years.




