Later there was discussion regarding the open container law, which was redrafted and adopted.

No action was taken to prohibit the use of utility or village properties for any action taken on placing a stop sign at the intersection of Maple and Elm streets.

heads submitted their reports, as did the superintendent of public works.

A representative from NewChanel's approached board members asking for the village to approve a rate increase. A public hearing will be held to determine this request at 6:45 p.m. on Feb. 20 prior to the regular board meeting.

Registration Day was set for March 10 from noon until 9 p.m. at the Norwood Municipal Building.

It was determined that the new water rate increase will become effective on June 1.

Two representatives of the Chemical People Task Force asked that new curfew hours be set for 10 p.m. in the Norwood village. The current curfew hour is set at 11:30 p.m. The new curfew law could stipulate that all minors 16 years and under be off the streets by 10 p.m. unless accompanied by an adult. This law would exclude students participating in school events.

Board members plan on making a decision regarding this matter at the next board meeting and would like the input from interested individuals.

Eight village residents attended the board meeting.
