## Clarkson, Providence College To Cooperate In Degree Program

## Check Out HEAP: O'Neil

ALBANY — Assemblyman John G.A. O'Neil (R-Parishville) has urged all people who think that they may qualify for the Home Energy Assistance Program (HEAP) to contact the St. Lawrence County Department of Social Services or Office for the Aged.

"Despite some of the problems that have happened in the past, I urge all interested people to check into this program," Assemblyman O'Neil said. "The program is vital to those people who need assistance in paying their fuel bills."

federally funded program administered by the state through the Department of Social Services to assist the elderly, disabled and people with low incomes with their winter fuel bills.

Recipients of supplemental Security Income (SSI) who live alone receive an automatic payment direct from the state, while other low-income persons must meet certain eligibility requirements. Additional benefits are available to elderly and/or disabled persons who spend more than 30 percent of their income on energy and who already qualify for HEAP.


