

Stoners Win Two Tests; Flyers Rebound At Massena

Uplifted by a courageous effort by forward Scott Manske, the Potsdam Sandstones boys basketball team blasted visiting Tupper Lake 82-70 Jan. 11 in a NAC league battle.

Manske, hobbled by sore knees, played one of his best games as a Sandstone, scoring 16 first half points, which brought Potsdam back from an early 14-3 deficit.

The Lumberjacks started strong, hitting every shot they took in the first four minutes. Tim Dennis, a standout point guard scored 14 first half points to pace the Jacks. He ended the evening with 19.

Potsdam trailed 20-15 after one period, but scored 23 second quarter points to take a slim 38-36 edge into the locker room. Fine floor play by freshman John Kmack, and hustling defense by junior Andy Ondek aided the comeback.

In the second half, the Stoners came out smoking, outscoring Tupper 15-6 in the first four minutes of the third. Mark Nunge got loose underneath, pouring in eight third period points, and seven fourth quarter markers for a total of 25 on the night to pace all scorers.

A 61-47 lead after 24 minutes opened into an 80-60 advantage midway through the final stanza. Coach Steve Kmack emptied his Stoner bench, and Tupper closed the gap, outscoring the hosts 10-2 in the final 2:00.

Besides scoring 20, Manske hauled in four rebounds and dished out six assists. He finished with a season-high 13 points, Rob Peets contributed nine, Basil Cheney added seven, and both Kmack and Jeff Bajza, back from an injury, flipped in four for the winners.

Stacy Miller hit for 11 and Mike Roberts chipped in 10 to aid Dennis for Tupper. The Lumberjacks were hurt by their own aggressive play, as Potsdam hit 26 of 40 free throws. Three Tupper players fouled out and two others had four personals.

"Scott Manske played tremendous basketball in the first half. It was a very courageous and gutsy effort," said Kmack.

"I felt we kept our poise in the first half when we were down by 11. We have a hard time getting out of the blocks. I'd say it was our poorest defensive effort of the year, our man to man defense wasn't good."

The second-year coach praised his backcourt. "John played super. As a freshman he has taken up the slack when Jeff Bajza was out. I'm impressed as a coach with his play, and I'm proud as his father."

"Andy Ondek has a hard time getting started, but once he gets going, he's great. He'll develop into a super player."

Stoners fly by N-N
Once again, the Potsdam quintet had a hard time getting untracked, but rebounded to defeat the Norwood-Norfolk Flyers 59-45 Jan. 8 for their first win at N-N in several years. It was the Flyers' first setback at home in two years.

Nunge was the catalyst for the Stoners scoring 27 points, 16 in the second half. Potsdam trailed 9-2 with 3:00 to go in the first quarter. They slowly closed the gap, trailing 22-21 at the intermission.

Both Manske and Nunge had four fouls but managed to stay free from any contact. Ondek had six second half points for 10 in the game. Manske and Peets added eight apiece and Kmack scored five, all from the free throw line in the final 3:00 of the game. Potsdam hit 16 foul shots in the fourth quarter to ice the landmark win.

Pete Molnar, a super guard for the Flyers, led his team with 25 points. Wolstenholme had 14 before fouling out.

"Beating Norwood-Norfolk at their gym was a big win for us, especially since Bajza wasn't able to play. The Flyers have great tradition, they're scrappy, and well-coached," said Kmack.

Potsdam is now 5-1 in the league, 10-2 overall heading into tonight's (Tuesday) game at home against Massena. They will travel to Malone Friday.

The Flyers, after a convincing 71-40 shellacking of Massena Jan. 11, are also 5-1 in the league, one game behind leader Canton. N-N hosts Canton tonight (Tuesday) in a NAC showdown.

In the Massena game, the Flyers received a strong 14 point effort from sophomore Scott Henry to pace a balanced score sheet. Smith, Wolstenholme, and Scott Collins all chipped in with 10. Molnar went down with a back injury in

the first half, scoring only four points. He is questionable for the Canton game.

Massena, now 1-5 in league action, was led by Craig Peets' 16 points.

Ski Trail Notes

While the alpine skiing in the Northeast is still on the sad side, the cross country skiing is pretty good locally.

All skiing is now quite good north of the border in southern Canada. The recent snow; have covered the ice crust which formed after the New Year's day storm. It is a fact that the warm air over the Christmas holidays did not go as far north as the Laurentians and Gatineau, and the pre-Christmas base was left undisturbed.

Many of the resorts both Alpine and Nordic, north of the border have all of their trails open, and in many cases there is natural snow skiing. Mt. Tremblant, for example, has had all of its trails open for sometime now, but the big Laurentian resorts does not have snowmaking on every trail.

There is, on the other hand, very little or no natural snow skiing at the alpine ski areas in New York and Vermont. Killington now has 50 trails open, but nearly all of them are only open on artificial snow. If you ski south of the border, you had better call in advance and accurately ascertain how many trails are open. Snowmaking is a very slow process, and many areas greatly overstate their ability to make snow and exaggerate or give the impression that they can cover all of their slopes over night.

Close to home there is good alpine and cross country skiing at snowdrift in Turin. Most of the county now has excellent cross country skiing, and it should get better this week. There is now an adequate base at Clarkson Seven Springs where the annual Potsdam Langlauf will be held on Jan. 26. The starting time will be about 10 a.m., but participants are encouraged to register in advance of the race date. Interested persons should contact Richard Mooers 265-2774 or Anthony Tyler 265-3558. There are various distances which

will be raced and different classifications. You do not need to be an expert racer to enter the Potsdam Langlauf. The various classifications make it a family affair.

Titus had five inches of snow on Sunday, and there are now nine trails open at that area. Recent snows and snowmaking at Gore combined to open up 16 trails. Tupper had seven trails open on Sunday and a good crowd of skiers. Whiteface now has a dozen trails open. For northern New York skiing, this is the greatest number of trails that have been open since before Christmas when the heat-wave came. Due to favorable weather forecasts, natural snow skiing should continue to develop this week and gradually more trails should be open. There is still no sign of that big snow storm that can open up all terrain skiing.

It now seems that the weather in the east has returned to normal. Most of the forecasters are now predicting colder than normal weather for the next 30 days over the majority of the northeastern United States. At least we have the ski season going in the right direction, and I am sure that the ski area operators are looking forward to recovering from the disastrous Christmas season in the northeast.
