Rescue Squad Answers 66 Calls In November

The Potsdam Rescue Squad answered a total of 66 calls in November. Of that total 42 were general helper calls and 24 were duty crew calls.

In that period the squad handled 67 patients and averaged five members responding to each call. The squad traveled a total of 525 miles for the month.

The squad handled four cases involving oxygen requests or breathing problems; seven home accidents, four miscellaneous accidents; 13 automobile accidents, of which one involved fatal injuries; 10 calls involving sickness or unknown illness; six standbys at public events; five fire calls; nine transports that involved less than 50 total miles traveled; one call for a drug overdose case; eight heart attack calls; and eight calls that required two or more ambulances.

Mark Robert, son of Clark and Ella Robert of Rt. 1, Colton, has been named to the dean's list at SUNY Oswego for the fall semester.

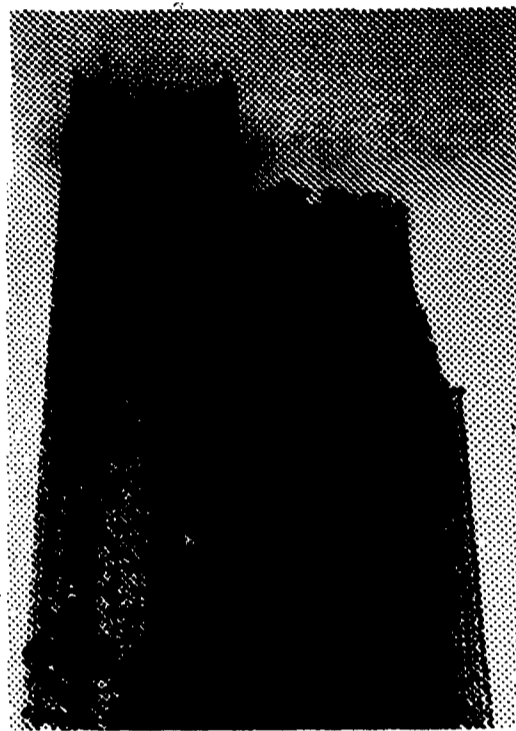
DAUGHTER BORN
