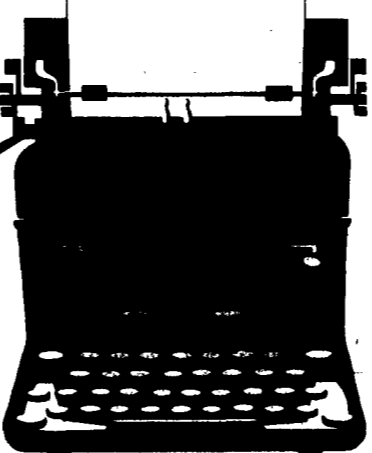
Congratulations to Larry Ford on his promotion to manager of Garn's in Potsdam.
