DISCOLORED TEETH

Q. What causes teeth to become discolored?

A. There are many culprits. Some types of discoloration may be organic. Most, however, merely reflect poor oral hygiene. Dark marks around the gum line can result from plaque that hardens. Regular professional cleaning and at-home oral hygiene can prevent this. Coffee, tea and tobacco are top stainers, and can attract natural teeth, composite or tooth-colored fillings, bonding, and some crowns.

Tetracycline, taken by a child under age eight or by his mother in late pregnancy, can cause tooth stains. Cracks in teeth enamel — from biting into something hard — can become stained. More serious tooth injuries which kill the nerve also result in discolored teeth.

All teeth are not the same color; they vary naturally. And teeth also naturally darken with age. Discoloration can be remedied. Call for an appointment to discuss the options modern dentistry offers.
