McCormick Gets Look At 'Real' World Of Work

ELIZABETHTOWN, Pa. — Timothy T. McCormick, an Elizabethtown College junior from Hannawa Falls, will spend part of his January break finding out about the "real world" of work.

What he learns may have a impact on his own career.

McCormick, a business computer science major participating in Elizabethtown's "Extern" program will spend the week of Jan. 13-19 at a business firm in Massena, N.Y., systems manager at Electronic Data Systems in Massena, does during a typical work week.

"Students get a close-up look at career fields in which they are interested," says Beverly V. Piscitelli, the program coordinator. "To spend a week with someone, asking questions, putting yourself in that person's shoes, is a good way to get a sense of whether a particular career option is for you."

Occasionally, the externship leads to a job offer, she says.

Overall, 85 Elizabethtown students are taking part in the Extern opportunity. Another 40 signed up, but places were not found for them in their career interest areas.

"The number of alumni, parents, and others offering to host a student grows yearly, but so does the number of students who want externships," says Piscitelli. "Maybe next year we'll have a place for every student."

Program Set

"Transfusion Transmitted Diseases" will be the topic of an educational program for area physicians at noon, Jan. 20 in the Canton-Potsdam Hospital Medical Library.

Dr. Melanie S. Kennedy, M.D., associate professor of pathology, and Dr. John C. Neff, M.D., professor of pathology, of Ohio State University, will conduct a two-way teleconference with the local physicians.

A 30-minute slide/lecture presentation will precede the teleconference.

The objective of this program is, in part, to review the sensitive and specific diagnosis of HTLV-III infection with particular emphasis on enzyme linked assays and protein immunoblot procedures (Western Blot), and the physician will be able to interpret the "lookback" blood donor procedure for patients who have received transfusions in the past.
