DAR Honors 'Good Citizens'

Good citizen awards were made to outstanding high school senior students at the regular meeting of the Nihanawate Chapter of the Daughters of the American Revolution Dec. 3 in the Potsdam Public Museum, with Regent Dorothy Bowers presiding.
Mrs. Parepa Adams, vice regent, presented the President General's Message, written by Ann Fleck, Washington, D.C.
Mrs. Mildred Jenkins presented the civil defense report on the topic: "What Schools Need To Teach."
February is American History Month. Regent Bowers will contact the mayors and supervisors of towns in St. Lawrence County asking them to so designate February.
Regent Bowers is delegate to the National Society Daughters of the American Revolution's Centennial Congress to be held in Washington, D.C. April 19-23.
Good Citizen awards, consisting of a pin, certificate, and wallet size card, were presented to eight

outstanding senior high school students of area schools, who participated in the DAR Good Citizens program. These students were chosen by their class of the individual schools on dependability, leadership and patriotism. Parents were also guests.
Four of the students were present: Robin Pay, Massena Central School, and her mother, Joy Fay; Alicia Barber, Canton Central School, and her mother, Karen Barber; Kim Allen, Norwood-Norfolk Central High School, and her father, Robert J. Allen; and Elizabeth Hourihan, Potsdam Central School. Absent were: Christian W. Arnold, Parishville-Hopkinton Central School; Randy Brockway, Colton-Pierrepont Central School; Joel Folsy, St. Lawrence Central, Brasher Falls; and Penny White, Edwards-Knox Central School.
Penny Anderson, Salmon River Central School, was chosen but did not compete in the October program. Her name will be submitted for the award in 1987.
Each student participating in the good citizen program has to write an essay of 500 words or less on the topic: "Our American Heritage and My Responsibility To Preserve

It." The outstanding essay was written by Alicia M. Barber, daughter of Peter W. and Karen T. Barber, Canton. She plans to enter college to study journalism. She intends to work in the media of radio, television, newspaper or magazine communications.
Following the awards, the program was presented by Mrs. Kay Wyant, former curator of the Potsdam Public Museum, who now works with children's programs for the museum. She spoke on "American Samplers" and had several on display, including one that she made in 1924 when she was in the third grade. The earliest mention of samplers goes back to 1502 when one was made for the queen. Mrs. Parepa Adams brought a sampler which was made by her great-grandmother, who was born in the early 1800s. She made it when she was 11, in New Hampshire.
