Norwood Library's annual report for 1986 was given at the annual meeting on Jan. 14 by librarian Marcia Murray. The report showed that 12,342 adult books were loaned and 8,362 junior books, the total circulation of 22,576 was an increase of 1,053 over 1985.

The number of library patrons increased by 261 in 1986 marking a record for the library. The number of books and non-book items such as records, pamphlets and sewing patterns which may be borrowed.

The library has provided the following services to the community: sponsoring of the Concert on the Green series, summer story hour,

pre-school library hour, adult health screening clinic, plant-sitting service, coupon exchange, Norwood Elementary class tours and use of the community room for many meetings and activities. The library received an award at the 1986 annual meeting of the North Country Library System for the many services it provided to the Norwood community. ## N-N School Board Meets In 1986

The Norwood-Norfolk Central School Board of Education met on Jan. 13 for its regular meeting. During the public hearings portion of the meeting, parents were present to ask questions about busing problems, justification of the superintendent's salary and suspensions of students. A letter was received concerning cigarette smoking at board meetings and several board members commented about this problem.

Warrants approved were general fund \$50,403.58, \$9,946.33, \$29,943.33 and \$58,742.63; school lunch fund \$669.03 and \$7,209.93; federal fund \$5,794.47 and \$295.15; capital fund \$1,091.00 and \$22,111.20 for a total of \$186,206.65 as of Jan. 13. Also approved were the extra classroom activity fund report for December, a contract for transportation of a handicapped student, preliminary request for 1987-88 BOCES ser-

VICES, review and placement of 17 handicapped students, a request for child-care leave, third reading of the AIDS policy, policy for reporting suspected child abuse and acceptance of bids on obsolete equipment. Appointment of a long-term substitute in grade 7 social studies was delayed since interviewing is not completed.

Among the reports presented were those on seat belt regulations for school buses and on parent-teacher conference evaluations.

An executive session was held to discuss principal's contract negotiations and extension of the superintendent's contract. At the end of the executive session a motion was passed to give Superintendent Theodore Wodzinski a two year extension on his present contract, giving him the superintendency through June 1990.



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
